CPS Commercial Composting & Recycling Program

SGA's Zero Waste Schools team has been busy helping Chicago Public Schools (CPS) restart its Commercial Composting & Recycling Program and is excited to work with CPS to expand the program to new schools this year.

During the *Back-to-School Composting & Recycling Webinar* last month, schools currently in the program, as well as any interested schools were provided an overview of the program that included an outline of zero waste team roles, standard operating procedures and best practices, and COVID adaptations.

Pumpkin Smash 2021



The **Pumpkin Smash** is an annual effort by communities to divert pumpkins from landfills by providing locations for residents to drop-off jack-o-lanterns to be composted. Organized by SCARCE, the event is held each year the Saturday after Halloween.

It's a great community sustainability project for school environmental or service clubs and community groups.

The 2021 Pumpkin Smash will take place **Saturday, Nov. 6**. Since city approvals must be submitted to your county recycling coordinator at least 30 days in advance of the event, now is the time to start planning. Refer to SCARCE's [How to Host a Pumpkin Collection](#) guide for more information.

Zero waste lunchrooms allow students to reduce, reuse, recycle, and compost to take action on climate change each and every day.



Composting keeps food out of landfills, avoiding the greenhouse gas emissions created when food and other organic materials decompose in the absence of oxygen. Making products using recycled materials uses less energy and reduces the need to extract new raw materials, which reduces the use of fossil fuels.



Even with COVID restrictions, it is still possible to implement waste reduction measures:

- Set up sorting stations in the lunchroom or outdoors. If meals are served in classrooms, set up hallway or classroom sorting stations.
- Promote **zero waste lunches** from home and the use of reusable water bottles.
- Employ **Offer v. Serve** for milk even if students don't have a choice of meal items.
- Check out the **Zero Waste Schools Toolkit** for sorting signs, tips on how to set up a sorting station, and many other helpful recycling and waste reduction resources.

International Compost Awareness Week poster & video contests



Know any creative students who'd like to help spread the word about the benefits of composting? Encourage them to enter this year's International Compost Awareness Week (ICAW) poster and video contests!

The contests are open now through Nov. 1, 2021.

All entries should highlight the theme of ICAW 2022: *Recipe for Regeneration: Compost*. ICAW is May 1-7, 2022.

Poster contest: Anyone in 9th grade (age 14) or older may enter. The winning poster will be reproduced and distributed to thousands nationwide to promote ICAW and will be featured on the Compost Research & Education Foundation website and the US Composting Council website. The winner will receive a \$500 prize.

Video contest: Anyone in grades 4–8 or ages 10–13 may enter. Videos must be 30 seconds or less. All video entries will be shown on the ICAW YouTube channel. The winning video will be highlighted on the ICAW website. The winner will receive a tablet.

SWANCC grants & presentations for schools

Waste Reduction Grants

PreK-12th grade public or private schools in SWANCC-member communities are eligible. Grant funds may be used to start or expand programs and projects focused on preventing waste – reusing items and recycling materials or composting food waste on-site or through a commercial service provider.

Education presentations

Schools in SWANCC-member communities can request in-person, virtual, or recorded presentations of the [Taking Care of Our Earth](#) presentation for ages 4-8. This interactive, educational, and entertaining 30-minute presentation addresses the environmental R's - Reduce, Reuse, Recycle, is correlated to NGSS, and addresses grade level standards. There is no cost for the program.

CDC supports the use of reusable foodware



During the pandemic, schools have turned to single-use foodware for their cafeterias under the assumption that these disposable items are safer. [Public health professionals](#) have found that since COVID-19 primarily spreads from inhaling aerosolized droplets, rather than through contact with surfaces, reusables are safe and even likely safer than single-use products.

The following statement from the [CDC Guidelines for Food Service and School Meals](#) supports these findings and the use of reusable food ware in school cafeterias: "*Given the very low risk of transmission from surfaces and shared objects, there is no need to limit food service approaches to single use items and packaged meals.*"

One Earth Young Filmmakers Contest

[One Earth Film Festival](#) seeks short, 3- to 8-minute environmental films from youth in third grade through age 25. Animated films of 45-seconds minimum are also accepted. Rules are more relaxed for those in grade 12 and up, and prizes have expanded. There are four \$1,000 top prizes for live action, animation, creativity, and post grad categories.

Deadline for submission is Jan. 5, 2022.

CHS Foundation Classroom Grant: CHS Foundation provides \$500 grants each year to PreK-12 teachers who have classroom projects that use agricultural concepts to teach reading, writing, math, science, social studies, and more. **Application deadline: Sept.15.**

Illinois Agriculture in the Classroom offers two grants:

- Teacher Project Grants provide up to \$300 to PreK-12th grade teachers for projects that promote agricultural literacy in the classroom. **Application deadline is Oct. 15.**
- Teacher Book Grants provide up to \$250 in books from a pre-selected list of titles to help teachers integrate agriculture into a variety of curriculum areas. **Application deadline: Oct. 15.**

Illinois Schoolyard Habitat Action Grant: Applicants must use native Illinois plants in their wildlife habitat area and be prepared to maintain and commit resources to the project for at least five years. Projects need to be implemented on school grounds or another public place. **Preliminary application deadline: Oct. 31. Deadline: Nov. 30.**
