Lincoln Park High School Launches Zero Waste Lunchroom Program



<u>Lincoln Park High School</u> (LPHS) in Chicago Public Schools, a school of 2,060 students, officially launched its zero waste program in the lunchroom and kitchen last month. According to Gary Cuneen, Seven Generations Ahead's (SGA) Founder and Executive Director, "This launch is part of SGA's work to support CPS in establishing food scrap diversion pilots toward the long-term goal of meeting waste diversion goals and expanding composting to more schools across the district."

Launch day at LPHS was truly a community effort, engaging school staff, teachers, and students. SGA's **Zero Waste Schools** (ZWS) Program Manager, Becky Brodsky, and ZWS Program Associate, Rebecca Koshi, were also onsite to assist and assess the impact. The high school is now sorting out liquids and recycling and commercially composting all food scraps, paper napkins, and lunch trays, as well as placing unopened packaged items and whole fruits from the school lunch on a share table for other students to take. LPHS typically filled twenty bags of landfill garbage per day during their five lunch periods. On launch day, they took that number down to just two!

Farm to School collaboration funding coming soon for Illinois schools

New funding will become available in Illinois for school food collaboratives building infrastructure and relationships to move healthy, local foods into schools. The <u>Lake Michigan School Food</u>



Systems Innovation Hub Grant administered by the Illinois Public Health Institute will strengthen the K-12 school food supply chain, improving access to nutritious, locally grown, and culturally relevant foods for children in the Lake Michigan region. Seven Generations Ahead is thrilled to be a state partner in this innovative new program!

Starting in late 2023, interested groups of schools, food producers, suppliers, distributors, and their community partners in Illinois should begin to develop their plan and build partnerships to strengthen the K-12 supply chain and marketplace.

The Illinois State Board of Education has released

four Farm to School surveys to gauge interest and past experience in farm to school focusing on school procurement of local foods for K-12 schools, IL farmers, processors, and distributors. Here are just a few highlights from this year's ICAW:


