One Earth Young Filmmakers Contest Global Awards Celebration


Sept. 17, 11:30 a.m., Gene Siskel Film Center, Chicago

EPA Youth Council



The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has developed the [National Environmental Youth Advisory Council \(NEYAC\)](#) as an opportunity for youth (ages 16-29) to offer advice and recommendations on environmental issues to the EPA directly. Selected applicants will be appointed to a two-year term.

The NEYAC is meant to be a committee "by youth and for youth" so they can provide their own thoughts, ideas, and solutions to the U.S. EPA administrator. The council presents an opportunity to reflect the diversity of the American people and to include them in the conversations

surrounding sustainability. **Application deadline is Aug. 22.**

Resources for teacher supplies

Back-to-school time can be costly for teachers and can also lead to a lot of waste. These organizations help get teachers the supplies they need at little or no cost while keeping perfectly good materials out of the landfill.

- [The Waste Shed-Chicago and Evanston](#) sell used art and classroom supplies in good condition. They offer a 25% discount for educators that provide a school ID. They also provide a "Free to Teachers" section that is also available to all educators.
- [SCARCE](#) focuses on reducing and reusing and offers classroom resources to teachers in need. For \$5, teachers can get a box of school supplies.
- [Greener Good](#) is an organization that sells reclaimed and reusable materials for crafters, educators, and artists at a low cost, as well as hosts creative reuse workshops.

New! Sustainability Tracking and Roadmap Tool



Start your school year off right with the Green Schools Alliance's [Whole School Sustainability Tracking and Roadmap Tool](#) (START). This new platform helps schools measure and improve their sustainability levels. Beginning with an interactive

survey, schools can establish a baseline and find resources to help create healthier and more sustainable learning environments.

START involves a benchmark to begin the process, a scorecard to help visualize sustainability levels and progress, analytics, and resources to help schools take action. This is an ideal tool for those wanting to track their sustainability journey while engaging the entire school community.

Grants and other opportunities

[Whole Kids Foundation Salad Bar Grant](#) Any district or independent school participating in the National School Lunch Program can apply. The grant program donates salad bars to U.S. schools to give kids daily access to fresh fruits and vegetables. **Applications are accepted on a rolling basis.**

[Illinois Agriculture in the Classroom](#) is offering two grants for Illinois teachers.

- [Teacher Project Grants](#) provide up to \$300 to PreK-12th grade teachers for projects that promote agricultural literacy in the classroom. **Deadline: Oct. 20.**
- [Teacher Book Grants](#) provide up to \$250 in books from a pre-selected list of titles

to help teachers integrate agriculture into their curricula. **Deadline: Oct. 20.**

SWANCC Waste Reduction Grant The Solid Waste Agency of Northern Cook County (SWANCC) is allocating funds to SWANCC member schools to assist in purchasing materials that promote the education and benefits of waste prevention. Grant coordinators may **apply and request** up to \$500 to expand their reduction, reuse, recycling, and composting initiatives. **Applications are due Nov. 10.**

Illinois Schoolyard Habitat Action Grant: Applicants must use native Illinois plants in their wildlife habitat area and be prepared to maintain and commit resources to the project for at least five years. Projects need to be implemented on school grounds or on other public property. **Deadline: Nov. 30.**
