## Rhode Island and reusables



Reusable food ware in a school lunchroom can seem like an impossible goal, but a recent article in the Washington Post showcased a school that made the switch look easy!

Brown Avenue Elementary, an elementary school in Rhode Island with around 200 students, has found success in their transition away from single-use disposables. They recently switched from Styrofoam lunch trays to stainless steel trays following the plastic-foam ban initiated by Rhode Island's state government. This ban was created as a result of the Food and Drug Administration's (FDA) determination that styrene, a chemical used to make polystyrene foam trays, can lead to negative health outcomes. Manasa Mantravadi, founder of the reusable food ware company, Ahimsa, shares that Styrofoam trays, especially when exposed to heat, pose a

significant health risk to children. Dangerous chemicals from polystyrene foam containers leech into food exposing children to potential carcinogens and other toxic chemicals.

By switching to reusables, not only are Brown Avenue's students being protected from harmful chemicals, but the school has incurred a cost savings. According to school officials, they will save \$3,500 per year as a result of the switch. The health benefits of transitioning away from foam food ware, coupled with the potential for cost savings, has already inspired other nearby schools to follow suit.

# Get ready for Plastic Free Lunch Day!





The biannual <u>Plastic Free Lunch Day</u> (PFLD) is coming up on **April 21-25!** PFLD, presented by <u>Cafeteria Culture</u> and the <u>Urban School Food Alliance</u>, is an easy way for schools to ease into reducing disposable packaging and foodware. Schools can participate for one day, a couple days, or the whole week.

Get your school excited for PFLD by presenting a <u>free screening</u> of <u>Microplastic</u> <u>Madness</u> during the months of March and April. Start <u>planning</u> NOW by checking out these great ideas!

Consider meeting with your school's food service staff to implement one or more of these changes:

- Replace single-use condiment packets with bulk service of sauces/dressings
- Wrap sandwiches in bulk (put in serving trays with an aluminum foil cover instead of individually wrapped with plastic film)
- Offer plastic utensils upon request only

### **Green Schools Conference 2025**

The **Green Schools Conference** 

(GSC) is the only event to bring together all stakeholders involved in making green schools a reality: people who lead, operate, build, and teach in schools. Designed to educate, connect,



and inspire, attendees will receive action-oriented training across disciplines and make lasting connections with peers and colleagues during targeted opportunities to exchange best practices and enhance green school initiatives nationwide.

The 2025 event will convene the green schools community in the LEED Gold City of Orlando at the Hilton Orlando Lake Buena Vista at Disney Springs to celebrate 15 years of the GSC during a two-day experience comprised of four workshops, 24 educational sessions, two main stage moments, four local tours, and dedicated networking opportunities.

GSC is presented by the <u>Center for Green Schools</u> at the U.S. Green Building Council (USGBC), in partnership with the <u>Green Schools National Network (GSNN)</u>.

The Solid Waste Agency of Northern Cook County (SWANCC) has just released their updated website! While the address remains the same, SWANCC has fully revamped their platform to be more user-friendly and utilizes modern features to make the user experience even better.

Updates to the website include a new

design, easier navigation, mobile-friendly experience, updated content, e-notify features, and Recycle Coach. Recycle Coach is replacing SWANCC's old Reuse and Recycling Directory and will help users identify correct practices and locations to properly recycle materials.

## Grants and other opportunities

Youth Outdoor Equity Leadership Fund The Children & Nature Network invites young

leaders in the U.S., Mexico, and Canada between the ages of 16 and 30 to request up to \$500 to grow professionally as a leader in the movement or to implement projects that create change in equitable access to nature, community health, well being, and justice. **Applications are accepted on a rolling basis.** 

<u>Illinois Conservation Foundation's Conservation Achievement Scholarship</u> Awarded to 4 high school seniors in Illinois who have demonstrated effective, voluntary, and longterm dedication to the preservation, protection, enhancement, and/or promotion of Illinois' natural resources. **Apply by Mar. 1.** 

Whole Kids Garden Grant Schools and nonprofits have the potential to earn a \$3,000 grant to support or create an edible educational garden to educate students and community members about the importance of local food systems. Apply by Mar. 5.

<u>2025 SNF Equipment Grants</u> Eligible applicants have the opportunity to win equipment grants, each worth between \$20,000 to \$100,000 of equipment. **Apply by Mar. 12.** 

<u>ComEd Green Region Grant</u> Now in its thirteenth year, the ComEd Green Region Grant awards grants of up to \$10,000 for conservation projects in Northern Illinois. Continuing this year, non-profits and educational agencies can apply for a grant with a letter of support from a government agency in their community. **Apply by Mar. 28.** 

<u>Algalita Studen Mini Grant</u> this grant is for students (ages 11-25) looking for financial support toward their project, internship, or education connected to addressing the plastic crisis and adjacent environmental issues. Mini-grants range from \$300 – \$2000 with a total of \$15,000 being awarded in 2025. **Apply by April 15.** 

OurEcho Challenge EarthEcho International invites students between the ages of 13-16 to apply for the 2025 OurEcho Challenge, a STEM competition focusing on biodiversity. Participants can work individually or in teams of up to three, proposing solutions to local ecosystem threats. Apply by April 22.

Shane McConkey EcoChallenge empowers young people to learn about environmental issues in their community, engage in critical thinking, identify innovative solutions, and take action as EcoChallengers for the planet. The competition is open to individuals or teams of students (pre-K through undergraduate students). Students under the age of 18 must have an adult advisor. Apply by April 22.
