Preparation pays off at Kilmer Elementary



Joyce Kilmer Elementary School is the latest Chicago Public School to launch a zero waste program in partnership with <u>Seven Generations Ahead (SGA)</u>. On May 13th, the SGA <u>Zero Waste Schools (ZWS)</u> team, students, staff, and parent volunteers joined forces to implement the program and ensure that launch day went smoothly. By committing to the program, Kilmer Elementary has taken a significant step in their zero waste journey and teaching kids lifelong sustainability habits.

With 748 students and a crowded lunchroom, the school needed two sorting stations that would allow students to enter at both ends. Despite the additional challenge of the tight space, the staff were enthusiastic and set a positive tone for everyone involved.

"The staff was very flexible and interested in making the

program work," said Becky Brodsky, Senior Program Manager for the ZWS program.

Kilmer students were also engaged and well-prepared for launch day. They knew to read the signs carefully and ask questions as they sorted their waste. There were also many trained student volunteers on hand to assist, with even more students eager to participate.

D65 Sustainability Plan: Sustainable Schools, Healthy and Just Futures includes goals centered around the following four categories:

- 3. Sustainable Operations
- 4. Transportation and Mobility

The D65 Sustainability Plan plan is the product of six months of dedicated work from a working group of 20+ staff, students, caregivers, Evanston and Skokie staff, and multiple local community based organizations who worked collaboratively and tirelessly to formulate this plan.

millions of people be part of the solution to plastic pollution. Here are just a few of the many ways you can start going plastic-free.

Below are some ideas to reduce your daily plastic use:

- Use glass or stainless steel containers for storing food and bring your own containers for leftovers when you eat out.
- Bring reusable bags with you wherever you go to avoid plastic bags and extra fees.
- Start using food wrap items that can be reused such as beeswax wraps or foodgrade silicone covers.

<u>Plastic Free Restaurants</u> Plastic Free Restaurants is dedicated to eliminating single-use petroleum-based products in everyday foodware. Plastic products are not only harmful to the environment but also human health. Their subsidy program is available to schools, non-profits, restaurants, and other for-profit entities to purchase safe reusable foodware products. Apply for a subsidy <u>HERE</u>.

<u>Summer Adventures with the Lake County Forest Preserves</u> Hands-on nature and history education programs for children and teenagers ages 4–16. Programs range from consecutive 3-day and 5-day options to programs you can experience with your child. Program prices vary. Partial scholarships are available in the case of financial hardship.

<u>The Bulk Milk</u> granting program, a project of the <u>Chef Ann Foundation</u>, supports school districts with the transition from conventional milk served in individual bottles/cartons to bulk milk dispensers with reusable tumblers. **Applications due June 26**.

<u>Illinois Schoolyard Habitat Action Grant</u> Earn up to \$2000 for the development of wildlife habitat at your school! Projects must emphasize student/youth involvement with planning, development and maintenance and increase the educational and wildlife habitat values of the site. **Apply by Dec. 3**.


